2 COLUMBUS CIRCLE "ENDANGERED" —

The National Trust for Historic Preservation has placed 2 Columbus Circle on a roster of the nation's "11 Most Endangered Places."

National Trust President **Richard Moe** called preserving Edward Durell Stone's 1964 design for Huntington Hartford's Gallery of Modern Art a matter of "utmost importance." The Museum of Arts and Design, selected as the next tenant for the famous site, has plans to alter the building dramatically.

Interviewed about the building recently for National Public Radio's "All Things Considered," the writer **Tom Wolfe** praised the design and said: "Everything should be reduced to steel, plaster and glass, and Stone was the first to say, 'Have we all gone crazy?'"

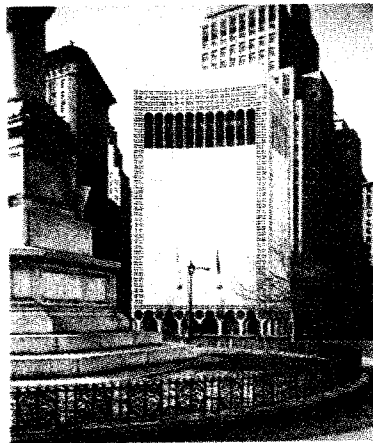
