- A café on the top level with spectacular views overlooking Central Park.

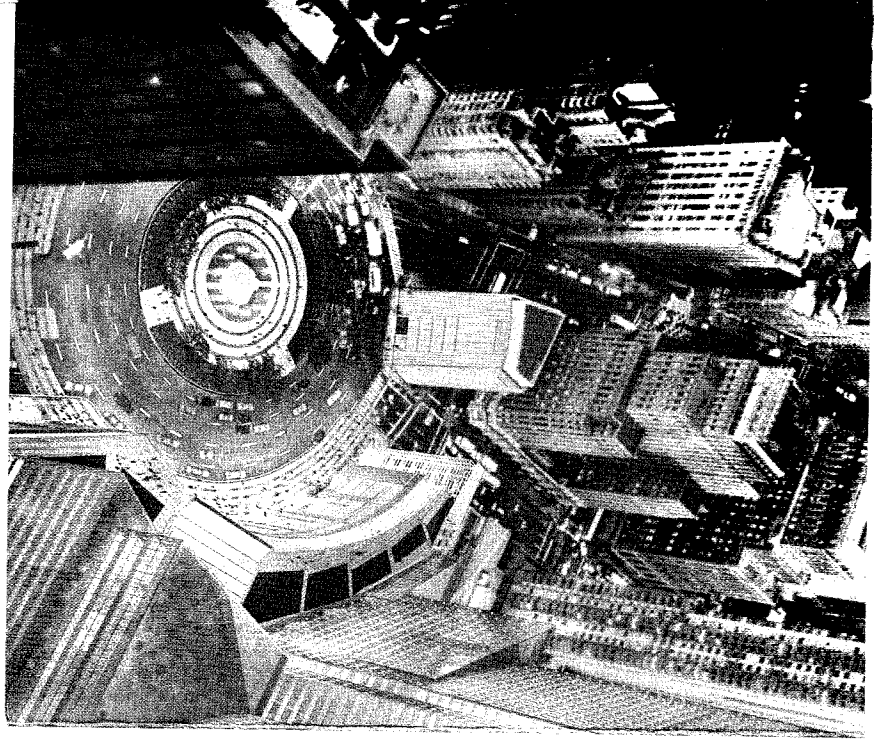

Project Features

The main focus of the renovation of the Queen Elizabeth II building will be to provide a state-of-the-art facility for the general public, to improve the building's energy efficiency and to provide a new and improved environment for the staff. The building's location, and the surrounding area, will be a major focus of the renovation.
