In all the months that the fate of the historic Grace
Church Houses on Fourth Church Houses on Fourth Avenue has hung in the balance, the 267 students of the Grace Church School have been watching, listening, debating—and drawing.

They've been committing to paper their impressions of the mid-19th century Gothle Revival facades in water-color, in charcoal or just in pencil. Some of the pictures

pencil. Some of the pictures are representational and deare representational and do-tailed, others are splashes of color and broad outlines. But they all reflect the architec-tural essence of the rure buildings that earlier this year were scheduled for demolition to make way for a new and 'badly needed school and church facility.

Cooperative Effort

"Mostly the children are hoping they can have both the gym and the facades preserved," said headmaster Charles N. Arlin last night. More than a dozen of the pictures hung on the finely carved mahogany walls of the school's refectory where a reception was held to pro-mote the effort to raise funds to preserve the fatunes to preserve the fac-cades and build a new facili-ty behind them.

More than half of the needed \$450,000 has been raised and the entire church complex has been added to the National Register of Historic Places, making it eligi-ble for federal restoration funds.

won until the full fund-raising goal has been met. If that does not happen, the church will proceed with its original and less expensive plan to demolish most of the Fourth Avenue row and build a new facility. Nov. 1 is the deadline
